#### 1 Welcome from the Chair

Welcome everyone to 5th Dartford Scout Group's activity day and AGM. I hope you find this newsletter detailing the Group's activities informative.

The AGM is part of the necessary governance of any Scout Group and it is the job of the Group Chair to support the Scouting aims of the Group and to ensure that money and facilities are available to pursue those aims in the interests of our young members.

The AGM and the individual section reports in this newsletter cover April 2015 to March 2016.

During the financial year, expenditure was slightly higher than our income from the subscription payments of our members. This deficit of £762.89 was more than covered by other Group income. Our biggest outcome every year remains capitation, the money that we pay to the Scout Organisation for its support of UK Scouting. That accounts for 50% of all member subscriptions and was a cash outlay in the past financial year of £7,915.74.

Net cash funds at year-end, including the New Hall Fund and other savings increased from  $\mathfrak{L}153,532$  to  $\mathfrak{L}162,384$  so the Group remains in a healthy financial position, although  $\mathfrak{L}125,000$  of that money is ring-fenced for the New Hall development.

The successful efforts of our fundraising team, with support especially from Dartford Borough Council, has enabled us to replace a lot of our tentage, especially important as the Group takes so many of our young people on more and more nights under canvas.

The success of 5th Dartford relies on people like you volunteering to help the 5th Dartford family.

The launch of Medcalf Scout Troop could not have been achieved without excellent new leadership and we continue to need you to volunteer to work with us to provide our kids with such an outstanding Scouting experience.

Volunteering does not just benefit the kids, but it benefits the wider community and it also benefits those of us who give our time to give something to others. We gain new skills, new confidence and new friends, when we volunteer to help.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity, on your behalf, to thank Paul, our GSL, and his team of section leaders, assistant leaders, activity leaders and all other helpers. His team of dedicated volunteers are critical to the success of our Group and of the wider 5th Dartford family. Thank you to you all for your time, energy and commitment.

Scouting is a fantastic modern success story. Our kids will be better adults, because they were once Scouts. The 5th Dartford family are an excellent example of that and I thank you all for your support.

#### 2 Group Scout Leader's Report

I would like to thank all of our leaders, instructors and helpers for the time, knowledge and skills they give freely, and congratulate them for making Scouting safe, enjoyable and fun. We have opened a new section, our Wednesday night Scout Troop named 'Medcalf' after our former GSL, increasing our membership this year to 223 members. Many of our youth

members are achieving their Bronze, Silver and Gold Chief Scout Awards with the Explorer Scouts gaining their Young Leader and Duke of Edinburgh Awards.

This year Jessica, one of our Explorer Scouts, attended the World Jamboree in Japan. Since returning, Jess has visited all our sections, running Jamboree-based activities and promoting the next Jamboree, due to take place in North America in 2019 (we look forward to encouraging our young members to apply to represent Dartford at the 2019 World Jamboree in due course).

We again worked with Sainsbury's Crayford and raised funds for Sports Relief, where 25 Scouts and 7 parents volunteered a total of 70 hours' bag packing, raising a fabulous £480. It was great to receive positive feedback, with customers commenting on how polite and helpful the Scouts were. Our thanks for Sainsbury's for providing free tee shirts and chocolates.



I am pleased to report that, again this year, we have sustained our number of camps and activities that we provide:

- District Dart-Jam;
- County Air Camp;
- Summer Camp;
- Bisley National Target Shooting Competition;
- Gilwell National Winter Camp;
- Easter Camp;
- National Archery Camp (my congratulations to Matthew Butler who was awarded gold in the under 18 Longbow category at the National finals);
- District Cub Camp; and
- most recently, our annual Family Camp, with 130 people attending!



We appreciate the support from Dartford Council and would like to thank them, in particular, for their recent Salute to Youth grant which we used to replace our tent and canvas, enabling us to keep camping affordable to all our members.

We have experienced a number of issues with our electrics and lighting this year, with us having a generator on site for several weeks before power was fully restored. I would like to thank Brian Lloyd for his assistance.

We also had a recent chalk fall due to tree roots and saplings causing issues; it was great that one of our parents, Pete Boyd, volunteered to clear the trees and treat the roots which were causing the problem, not forgetting the 'Spring Chicken Club' who undertake a number of jobs throughout the year including chalk shovelling and sweeping when they are not practising archery.

With our plans for a new hall, we have been making steady progress with Karen leading the fundraising team. Dave Monteith completed the London Marathon this year in 4:54, raising funds for both the Multiple Sclerosis Society and our New Hall Fund. Darren Enever has taken the lead with the design drawings, getting surveys completed and obtaining quotes for the work - it would be great to see the work started in our centenary year.

With our group having 10 youth sections and three activity teams we depend on parent and young leader assistance to run good meetings, so it is sad but not surprising that we have changes:

- Shea Gardner (Edwards Beaver Scout Leader since September) is starting an apprenticeship in June so will be standing down as leader. Shea will, however, continue to help with Phillips Cubs.
- Tracy Gardner (Phillips Cub Scout Leader) is no longer able to commit to regular meetings having been promoted at work (to a position that involves a lot of travelling). Tracy will, however, continue as a Group Section Leader
- Dave Monteith (Earley Troop Scout Leader) is taking a step back after 11 years of leadership to a Group Section Leader assisting with group activities.

 Maggie Lilleycrop and Debbie Prescott (Peacock Beavers Leaders), after 14 years running the section, are looking forward to retiring from leadership, although they will continue to support the group going forwards.





I would like to express my thanks for their enthusiasm and commitment, as I am sure that all their previous, current youth members and parents appreciate the opportunity of Scouting.

Baden-Powell never referred to Scouts as an organisation but as a movement, realising that change is constant. For the concept of Scouting to continue and be successful, we need to constantly change with the times, keeping pace with culture, education, technology and society. Hence, approaching our centenary, we as leaders completed a group self-review to identify our strengths as well as our weaknesses. We subsequently reached out to our Regional Development Team and asked for their help on how we can engage more with parents and encourage them to volunteer whatever time they can spare to ensure that we evolve and continue to be successful in future years - so please be prepared for a conversation about what aspects of Scouting you enjoy!

#### Activities and Events:

St. George's Day parade was, as always well attended and well turned out.

10th National Archery Tournament in Phasels Wood, attended by a party of 21 including 4 from the Earley Troop; an excellent camp for those having taken part in a 7 week tutorial prior to the competition.



District Tug-of-War: This year we entered three teams consisting of 8 Scouts each, but no medals this year.

DartJam was very well attended as we had postponed our Easter Camp this year to ensure as many Scouts as possible could support this District event.



18 of our members participated in the District cricket tournament on a beautiful early summers evening.

7 Earley Troop Scouts attended the 2015 Summer Camp at Ferneycrofts in the New Forrest, with great weather and activities including Overnight Hike, Axe Throwing, Raft Building, Backwoods cooking, shelter building and much more.

Power Kiting on Blackheath was another exhilarating day out.

6 Earley Troop Scouts attended Bisley with other group members to compete once again in the National Scout Air Rifle Championships, with Jason taking the Bronze medal in the Senior knockout.



Remembrance parade was again well attended, with the Scouts making the effort to look smart and attentive.

An excellent turn-out for Birthday Parade and church service followed by Jump Giants for a trampoline adventure with the Explorers, and pizza thereafter.

We attended the National Winter Camp at Gilwell Park for white water rafting and far too many activities to list; a cracking camp for the young folk, but not for the feint hearted.

#### Awards:

A couple are yet to complete their Duke of Edinburgh paperwork and volunteering, but we continue to offer the support they need.





A number of Explorers assist as 'Young Leaders' with younger sections and many have completed training, which is not only transferable when they reach 18, but counts toward their Young Leader's belt, to recognise their achievements.

#### Activities and Events:

Without wanting to duplicate the Earley Troop activities, the Explorer Scout Unit did pretty much the same, with the addition of Ten-pin bowling, Football and Frisbee tournaments on the heath and Gilwell24, a 24hr 'no sleep' action weekend. Two teams represented the unit, under Jim's management, on the Duke of Edinburgh Chase, a cross country Night Hike on a course not less than 15 miles and both teams did very well. We also had the good fortune for one of our Explorers, Jess Boreham, to represent the unit and Dartford at the 2015 World Jamboree in Japan, an experience of a lifetime. ### Appendix 1 Statement of Account for year 2015/2016

#### 1. Introduction

This document outlines the high-level activity on the 5<sup>th</sup> Dartford Scout Group main account for the year 2015/2016.

It was agreed by the group that the subscriptions collected from each member would not increase from £10 per month that is currently set, but this will need to be reviewed again by the group in the next financial year (2016/17). Any families suffering financial difficulty can speak in confidence to Group Scout Leader, Paul Boreham, as the Group will always try to ensure that it supports the whole 5<sup>th</sup> Dartford family.

The breakdown of expenditure and income are depicted by two pie charts (which can be found at the end of this document) that show in monetary terms what was spent and received by each category. The categories for Income are as follows:

#### 2. Overview

#### Income


