

## 1 Welcome from the Chair

Welcome everyone to 5th Dartford Scout Group's activity day and AGM. I hope you find this newsletter detailing the Group's activities informative.

The AGM is part of the necessary governance of any Scout Group and it is the job of the Group Chair to support the Scouting aims of the Group and to ensure that money and facilities are available to pursue those aims in the interests of our young members.

The AGM and the individual section reports in this newsletter cover April 2017 to March 2018.

At last year's AGM, we announced that we were working with award-winning architects, Zedfactory on plans for a New Hall and the biggest news of the non-Scouting year for the Group is that our plans have been approved by Dartford Borough Council.



So, all we have left to do now is finish the fundraising efforts and to build a New Hall.

The Executive Committee made a decision in the last financial year to increase subscriptions by £2 per month, which came into force this year. This is our first increase since September 2008. I would like to emphasise that we want to promote Scouting for all and if any of our members have any problems affording this increase, I would encourage you to speak discretely to Group Scout Leader, Paul Boreham.

As ever, the success of 5th Dartford relies on people like you volunteering to help the 5th Dartford family. I hope we can encourage more of you to give up a little bit of your time to help all of our children gain even more from being members of 5th Dartford.

I want to make a special mention of Lyn Medcalf. Lyn's family (together with lots of other family groups) have been the backbone of 5th Dartford for well over 60 years. Lyn is our current Assistant Group Scout Leader. Her late husband, Dick Medcalf was Group Scout Leader for many years, his father was one of the people who built the current hall in the 1959 and Lyn's sons were both members of the Group throughout their youth, have been active fundraisers and continue to support the Group.

Lyn is tireless in her efforts for the Group. In addition to running a section and helping out with other sections, she is the person most responsible for our current fundraising efforts and she is brilliant at obtaining the kind of large scale fundraising that we need from organisations like Garfield Weston and the Veolia Trust.

One of the challenges for the Group during the year in question was the difficulty of recruiting adult leaders and helpers. It is a problem for Scouting across the country and we are not alone. If anyone is interested in becoming a part-time helper, or full-time helper or leader, please speak to Paul Boreham or to me as we would love to welcome you.

I would like to take this opportunity, on your behalf, to thank Paul, our GSL, and his team of section leaders, assistant leaders, activity leaders and all other helpers. His team of dedicated volunteers are critical to the success of our Group and of the wider 5th Dartford family. Thank you to you all for your time, energy and commitment.

Scouting is a fantastic modern success story. Our kids will be better adults, because they were once Scouts. The 5th Dartford family are an excellent example of that and I thank you all for your support.

## **2 Group Scout Leader's Report**

What another busy year! Special thanks also to our Executive who support us so the Scouting side can run such an active programme of events; they provide the governance to our group, ensuring that we achieve the high standards expected and remain fully compliant with the Scout Association and Charity Commission rules and best practices.

As a Scout Group, we pride ourselves on being part of the local community, taking part in such events as Dartford's Remembrance Service, District St. George's Day celebrations, County's Air Camp, Freemason craft fairs, the United Reformed Church's centenary celebrations and local schools' fetes. With regret we have made the decision to suspend Edward Beavers, inviting all Wednesday members to transfer over to Friday evening's Peacock Colony. I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to Abi, Martin and the Explorer young leaders Ellie and Callum for all their endeavours with Edwards Beavers. If you are interested in helping out with any of the sections or activities and have maybe an hour or so a week, or every other week, please contact me to discuss the best way to get involved.

At the moment we are guilty of calling on the same few climbing, target shooting and archery instructors, hence we are looking to schedule instructors' courses so that we can continue to offer these adventurous activities going forward. If you are interested in getting involved, please feel free to contact me.

Recently I watched with interest the BBC1 documentary 'The Doctor Who Gave Up Drugs' presented by Dr Chris van Tulleken, about fresh ways to approach mental health and wellbeing which focussed on outdoor living and activities - all of which follows the Scouting ethics that Baden-Powell wrote about over a 100 years ago and which are still fundamental to Scouting today.

After successfully celebrating our centenary Summer Camp at Les Manigys in Guernsey, this year's Summer Camp has been booked at Linnet Clough on the edge of the Peak District, with three minibuses booked and activities planned. However, this year it will be with a twist - no tents! - with the barn accommodation reserved and the bothy booked for the overnight expedition.

### **3 Section Reports**

In addition to the group camps, which are always very well attended by the unit, this year saw two Explorer only camps, planned and led by the YP without adult supervision, known as 'On Passport'. ## Appendix 1 Volunteering Opportunities

Drinks Preparation	
<b>Description</b>	Preparation of drinks for the Cubs and then cleared away during the section evening break
<b>The role involves</b>	Preparing squash for the Beavers/Cub/Scout for their break, ensuring the kitchen is tidy afterwards
<b>Expected time</b>	30min per week, not required every week
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, None

Sub Collection	
<b>Description</b>	To register the subs being paid in monthly, providing receipts
<b>The role involves</b>	Collecting the monies/cheques paid by the Beavers/Cub/Scout monthly, registering the amount, providing a receipt providing a summary to the leader. A basic understanding of taking and proving receipting of monies, with support from the leader and Group treasurer.
<b>Expected time</b>	1 hour per month, not required every week
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, None

Games Coordinator(s)	
<b>Description</b>	To coordinate a 15min game(s) as part of the evening schedule, enabling the leaders to prepare for the next badge/tuition session
<b>The role involves</b>	A part of a section evening, depending on the programme for the evening there can be between 1 and 3 games scheduled to break up the different sessions. There is a great number of Cub game resources available on the internet as well as a well-stocked games cupboard. No experience necessary, only a sense of fair play and good fun
<b>Expected time</b>	Between 15mins to 90mins of an evening, noting that this can be alternate weeks
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, utilise a number of online resources for new invigorating games as well as the old favourites, Module 01 - Essential information: Safeguarding and safety in Scouting

### Badge and Records Keeper

<b>Description</b>	To keep the Beavers/Cub/Scout achievement records up to date so that they are presented with their badges
<b>The role involves</b>	Confirming with the Leader the activities completed in the section evening and which Cubs completed them successfully, then updating the records, identifying which badges need to be ordered when they are successfully gained. Note that attendance every week is not required, with full support providing by the leadership team.
<b>Expected time</b>	30 minutes every few weeks
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, familiarisation of 'On-Line Scout Manager' application and award scheme

### Skills Instructor(s)

<b>Description</b>	To teach basic Scouting skills, aligned to the Beavers/Cub/Scout programme and award system
<b>The role involves</b>	Lead a 30min session with a number of Cubs teaching them new skills, making the subject interesting and enjoyable. The range of subject matter can be, but not limited to, making toffee apples, fire lighting, how to clean shoes to zoology...
<b>Expected time</b>	30mins as agreed and arranged with the programme (ad-hoc)
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, Module 01 - Essential information: Safeguarding and safety in Scouting

### Assistant Leader

<b>Description</b>	Supports and assist the Leader
<b>The role involves</b>	As part of the leadership team provide a balance programme of fun activities enabling the Cub to progress and achieve their badges
<b>Expected time</b>	2 hours per week, this role can be shared and flexible in coordination with other adult volunteers.
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, Modules 01-Essential Information, 02-Personal Learning, 03-Tools for the Role

<b>Leader</b>	
<b>Description</b>	The manager of the section, coordinating activities
<b>The role involves</b>	As the manager of the section, you form a leadership team to support the Beavers/Cub/Scout to achieve the most out of their Scouting, coordinating a programme of fun events and activities in order they achieve their Chief Cub Scout award
<b>Expected time</b>	2 hours per week, this role can be shared and flexible in coordination with other adult volunteers.
<b>Training</b>	DBS clearance, Modules 01-Essential Information, 02-Personal Learning, 03-Tools for the Role, 05-Fundamentals of Scouting, 06-Changes in Scouting, 08 Skills of Leadership, 09-Working with Adults, 10-First Aid, 11-Administration, 12-Delivering a Quality Programme


5th Dartford Scouts is a member of The Scout Association, with 28 million members worldwide with 500,000 youth members in the UK belonging to 115 Counties, 895 Districts comprising of 8,000 Groups with 24,000 sections – Whose success is dependent on the delivery of fun and exciting programmes by inspired and motivated volunteers who are properly supported.

# Finance Report 2017 / 2018

During the financial year, expenditure was slightly lower than our income from the subscription payments of our members. The surplus of £215.92 was not enough to cover future increases in expenditure, so the Group made the decision to increase the monthly subs from £10 to £12 from 1st April 2018. Our biggest outcome every year remains capitation, the money that we pay to the Scout Organisation for its support of UK Scouting. That accounts for 39% of all member subscriptions and was a cash outlay in the past financial year of £6,006.00.

Net cash funds at year-end, including the New Hall Fund and other savings increased from £162,384 to £167,197 so the Group remains in a healthy financial position, although £129,000 of that money is ring-fenced for the New Hall development.
